On August 17, 1560, reformer John Knox and five of his colleagues presented the first reformed Confession of Faith written in the English language to the Parliament of Scotland. 'The Scots Confession', as it is now known, united all of Scotland in its politics and in the church. From that day on, the nation was united under a Protestant Flag, emblazoned with the cross of St. Andrew. It was the birth of the Church of Scotland, and Presbyterianism became a new denomination of Christians. It is from an unadorned Calvinist faith of Word and Sacrament, preached passionately in Scotland by the great reformer, John Knox, during the sixteenth century that First Presbyterian Church continues to draw its life and mission. With voices singing and bagpipes playing, we offer our worship to the Glory of God.

We are grateful for our heritage and pray God's blessing on His servants in all lands.



(This hymn was commissioned by Laurinburg Presbyterian Church in celebration of its 150th anniversary. It was written by Mary Louise Bringle, nationally known hymnologist, Professor of Religion at St. Andrew's University, and former member of the church's chancel choir. It was first sung on September 20, 2009, at the 150th celebratory worship service. The hymn is sung to the tune, Brother James' Air, which was composed by James Leith Macbeth Bain who was born in Scotland in 1840. He was a healer, mystic, and poet known to his friends simply as Brother James. He founded the Brotherhood of Healers, and he and his fellow healers often sang to their patients during healing sessions. In the latter years of his life, he worked among the poor in the slums of Liverpool where he died in 1925.)




Faith on the Fifth Offering Sunday, October 31



THE SCOTTISH TRADITION

The Presbyterian Church is steeped in Scottish tradition as it was developed in the 16th century by John Knox. In 1560, he developed the First Book of Discipline which attempted to apply the theocratic system, developed in Geneva, Switzerland by John Calvin, to a whole kingdom. In each congregation, there would be a minister and elders holding office and forming a Session with the consent of the congregation. Presbyteries, Synods, and General Assemblies were part of this plan as well. Besides the ecclesiastical features, the book sketched out notable schemes of national education and relief for the poor.

For conduct of public worship, Knox prepared a Book of Common Order which was approved by the General Assembly in 1564. This document suggests much about the order of Scottish worship and its rugged simplicity included in today's service. A few comments are in order so that worshipers might fully appreciate this service.

- 1. The Entrances are of strategic importance. The Scottish Presbyterian held in highest honor the open Word of God and the Communion (Great Entrance). Thus, each Sunday the people would stand in honor as the holy items were brought into and taken from the Sanctuary. This custom is still observed in the old parish churches of Scotland.
- 2. The Old Scottish Gloria Patri will be sung by the choir.
- 3. Scottish Presbyterians are heard affirming their faith. Today's service includes the Scots Confession. This confession was written in 1560 by six ministers, including John Knox, in a period of four days. It is grounded on the infallible word of God.
- 4. The bagpipes are Scotland's traditional music makers. The sounds are stately, joyous, and thrilling. Depending on the particular clan of Scots, the royal dress was that of tartan kilts.
- 5. While our service order is not an exact replica of the traditional Scottish service, it highlights the tone and distinctiveness of that worship event.



On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, a Catholic monk, posted *The Ninety Five Theses*, the common title to his *Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences* on the castle door at Wittenburg. Though the disputation did not take place, it launched a Reformation of the church and resulted in the birth of the Protestant Church. We commemorate this memorial date and celebrate the particular gifts of the Reformation which we hold dear. Among those are the *solas* that have formed the theology of the Presbyterian Church.

Sola scriptura (by Scripture alone)
Sola fide (by faith alone)
Sola gratia (by grace alone)
Solo Christo (through Christ alone)
Soli Deo (glory to God alone)

We celebrate our common commitment to Jesus Christ and our acknowledgement that we come to know Christ only by God's grace.

To God be the glory.

NOTES

Is the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, an auld Scottish Rite?

Many people are under assumption that the *Kirkin' o' the Tartan* is an ancient Scottish Church Ceremony. Actually, nothing could be further from the truth. While based on Scottish legend and folklore, this ceremony is distinctly American. It traces its roots to the life and ministry of The Reverend Dr. Peter Marshall, a Scottish émigré. Dr. Marshall was a prominent minister in the Presbyterian Church, who served as the Chaplain to the United States Senate at the advent of World War II. In April 1941, while serving as the Pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Dr. Marshall titled one of his sermons *Kirkin' o' the Tartan*. This name soon became attached to church services that celebrate with pride their Scottish heritage. While more commonly celebrated by Presbyterian and Episcopal Churches, today this celebration is utilized by a variety of Christian denominations for Scottish heritage events.

What was the origin of the Tartan?

The exact origin of the Scots' love of the tartan is shrouded in the mists of ancient times. According to one common and widely held legend, St. Margaret introduced the use of the Tartan for clan identification purposes. This was a way of achieving unity (a rare commodity in Scottish History) within diversity. The use of the tartan in a generic sense was for all Scots. But, the particular designs for clan and familial identity did not begin until the nineteenth century. Margaret was a gentlewoman of noble birth, who planned a religious vocation. She was persuaded, however, by Malcolm, King of Scots, to become his queen. Malcolm was a boorish man; he was uncultured and illiterate. Margaret softened his harsh ways, and led him to be a better king. It was said of Margaret that she *admonished the wicked to become good and the good to become better*. She remains a revered figure in Scottish history.

Why was the tartan banned?

The Scots and the English are very different people, with different cultural origins and different traditions. Even today, a Scot may speak, with a twinkle in his eye, of England as *the auld enemy*. During the long course of Scottish history, the Scots and the English were to make war against one another many times. For the Scots, there were times of freedom, beginning with the revolts of William Wallace and Robert the Bruce, and times of subjugation. The last Scottish rebellion began in 1745, and ended in 1746 with the Battle of Culloden Moor, wherein the Scots led by *Bonnie Prince Charlie*, were defeated by the English.

Following this battle, the English adopted a policy of *cultural genocide*. This was known as the *Act of Proscription* of George II. The wearing of the kilt, the use of the Gaelic language, the ancient *clan system*, and all other elements of Scottish culture and nationalism were banned. These acts were meant to strip the Highland Scots of their cultural attributes, which further distanced them from their English speaking conquerors. While these bans remained in effect, memories of *things distinctly Scottish* were all but lost. Like warm embers from a long-dead fire, these Scottish traditions remained alive only in the memories of ancient grandparents.

According to legend, during these trying times the Scottish people would secretly carry a small piece of their clan's tartan to church on Sundays. When the minister ended the service with the Benediction, that tartan was blessed and God's favor was bestowed upon the Scottish people. King George III repealed the Act of Proscription in 1782. It was not until the 19th Century and the Reign of Queen Victoria, that a renaissance of Scottish culture began. The Queen, strongly influenced by the romantic writings of Sir Walter Scott, sought to revive the wearing of the kilt and other Scottish traditions.

What is The Kirk?

In Britain and Europe, Presbyterian Churches are usually known as *Reformed Churches*. In Scotland, however, our tradition is the established and sanctioned Church of the Government of Scotland. So our Christian tradition is known as *The Church of Scotland* [in the same manner that the *Church of England* is the Anglican (i.e. Episcopal) Church]. The Church of Scotland is commonly known simply as *The Kirk*.

Community Table on Saturday, November 6 from 9:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m.







Black cross: Jesus died on the cross.

Red heart: God loves us.

White rose: We can trust in Jesus to

show us God's way.


Blue background: This peaceful colour

MAKE YOUR OWN EDIBLE SEAL

Ingredients:

Slice of bread; dried fruit such as golden and dark raisins/sultanas, cranberries, apricots, apples, shaved coconut; spreadable cream cheese

Materials needed:

Large empty can or large round biscuit/cookie cutter, butter knife, small plate

Instructions:

- 1. Use the empty can or biscuit/cookie cutter to cut a round circle from the slice of bread.
- 2. Spread cream cheese on the circle until it is all covered.
- Use the different coloured pieces of dried fruit to make a seal of your own using (a) symbol(s) that remind you of something important about God and Jesus (heart, cross, dove, circle, flame...).
- 4. Show your creation to the group, and explain why you chose the symbols you used.
